Why recycle electronics?

- Rapid demand for the newest technology has resulted in a large number of used and discarded electronics, which take up a large amount of space in landfills.
- Improper disposal of electronics poses serious environmental risks due to the hazardous materials they contain, including lead and mercury.
- Discarded electronics contain valuable resources, such as precious metals, engineered plastics, and glass, which require significant energy to manufacture. When electronics are disposed of instead of recycled, these resources cannot be recovered and additional pollution is generated to manufacture new products.
- It's the Law. The disposal of video display devices in solid waste landfills or incinerators is prohibited in NH under RSA 149-M:4.
